The Power of the I nfant Christ in U s

n countless souls...Christ remains as an infant; He is in them but neglected, because they do not know the mystery of their own being.

There are many Catholics who are so intent upon exterior activities, and on activities which are divorced from what should be their daily life, that they allow no rest either to themselves or to those near them. God not only asks them to rest in Him, but asks of them that He may rest in them.

There is a huge force, a tremendous power for love, being neglected, not being used, at the time when it is needed as never before, and when every sign seems to be pointing to it and challenging it as the only answer—the power of the Infancy of Christ...

If everyone in whom Christ lives at all, in

whom He is an infant—which means anyone whose soul is alive at all—surrendered themselves to Him, resting in Him, that He might rest in them, in each one of them the world's redemption would begin as it began in Mary, the Mother of God.

Christ is formed in us, and we are formed into Christ, when we rest in Him and He rests in us. In Advent Christ rested in Mary - still, silent, helpless, utterly dependent. The Creator trusted Himself to His creature. This was a foreshadowing of what the Incarnation would mean for us: for in us too, Christ rests as He rested in Mary.

H ow the image of the I nfant on the Cross originated in the heart of our F ounder

"Many years ago I had an Infant painted on German paper that had him sleeping quietly on a cross. Oh, how much that symbol pleased me! I gave it to a crucified person of holy life who was directed by me as long as she lived...I wished, as I desire for you, for that soul to be a child in purity and simplicity and that she sleep on the cross of the gentle Jesus.

"So on Christmas you will have the Infant in your heart and be transformed entirely into him with love. Sleep with him on the crib of the cross, and at the divine lullaby that Mary Most Holy will sing go to sleep with the Divine Infant, being in union with his heart. The lullaby of Mary will be: 'May your Will be done on earth as in heaven'...."
