Meet our Sr. Mary Magdalen of the Good Shepherd

Grateful for 50 Years of Passionist Fidelity

1966 - August 13 - 2016

Recently our Jubilarian graciously shared her vocation journey and God's drawing her to himself in Passionist cloistered life.

Was there a particular person or event that inspired you to want to be a religious sister? Did you always think of being a cloistered nun? Or an active sister?

As far back as I can remember thinking about my future, I thought I would be a religious Sister. I don't know how it started. At that time, there was a full staff of religious Sisters - Ursulines from Mount Joseph - in the grade school of my parish, St. Thomas More – 9 Sisters, 1 for each grade and a music teacher. And there were Sisters of Charity of Nazareth in St. Mary's Academy in the neighboring parish of St. Francis de Sales where I went to high school. Also Sisters of Mercy in the school at St. John's parish in the county, whom we saw on some occasions when we went to Mass there. And of course, they were in full habit in those days. I always thought about being a foreign missionary Sister. My aunt, who made annual retreats at our monastery on Benita Avenue in Owensboro, brought me with her on two retreats when I was about 13 and 14 years old. That was my first experience of cloistered life. I was attracted to it, but of course was too young then to think about entering any time soon, and I didn't think about it anymore.

Did you ever think about entering a different religious community? As I was growing up, I wrote for information to a

couple of missionary communities, but I was still years away from being old enough to enter, so I never got to the point of seriously thinking about entering any of them.

You went to college for a year. What motivated you to do this? Did you have a certain career in mind? Why didn't you finish? During high school I got interested in being a medical doctor. I went to a Catholic college, Catherine Spalding College (now Spalding University) in Louisville. During a retreat for the students that was held during the semester break in January, I was reminded of the retreats I made with my aunt at







our monastery in Owensboro. Those memories were in my mind when I made a visit to the Blessed Sacrament in the college chapel. It was then that I experienced Our Lord's call from the tabernacle. It was quiet, nothing dramatic, but I knew then that this was my vocation, and I've never had any doubts about it.

Did you ever want to get married? I never had any strong desire for marriage. I guess the religious call was always latent, although I put it on the back burner during high school.

What was your family's reaction? I was dreading telling them, because I

knew the emotional pain it would cause them, since the cloister was so strict in those days. The nuns could never go home for anything, not even deaths in the family. But I knew that they would not oppose my decision. My parents made it clear to us when we were growing up that they would never interfere in our vocational decisions, and they didn't.

How did their support over the years grow? Once they got to know the community, and got over the initial pain of me leaving, they were happy about my vocation. My mother even told me that she wouldn't want me anywhere else, not even in any other religious community, and my father once told me that he wished he could bring everybody to the monastery and show everybody how happy we were. I think that was sparked by someone saying something to him to the effect that it must be hard for him that I was in the monastery.

What are some memorable experiences of monastic life? I've always been very grateful that I had the privilege of knowing and living with our five foundresses and Sister Mary, who entered as a postulant in Scranton. She was in her forties and probably would not have been accepted if they hadn't been planning the new foundation in October 1946. They accepted her for the new foundation, and she came about a week after the foundresses ar-

rived. She died about a month before my first profession, so I lived with her for almost two years, and I lived with the other foundresses for many more years.

Also, I'm grateful for the classes we had on Scripture, Passionist spirituality and history, etc. from various priests through the years, and the retreat Sundays with Msgr. Powers during the Jubilee years of 1974 and 1975. And now I'm very happy and excited about the work the Holy See is doing to revitalize women's contemplative life and all that's involved in that, and I'm looking forward to Mother Fernanda's visit to our community in November. (Sister is referring to a formal Visitation of the Holy See to all our monasteries throughout the world. Mother Fernanda, delegate of the Holy See, will be visiting the U.S. monasteries in the month of November.)


What are some jobs you have had in the monastery? I've worked in the kitchen, made altar breads, done liturgy planning, helped to care for our elderly and sick Sisters, cleaning, archivist, secretary Council Member.

Do you have a Word of Wisdom for our readers? I urge everyone in these critical times for our nation and the world to study in depth, as much as possible, the teachings of the Church on the life issues, abortion, euthanasia, and on the nature of the human person, sexuality, marriage, etc. Learn not only what the Church teaches, but also the reasons for her teachings. These teachings are so often rejected because so often people do not understand the reasons for the teachings, which correspond to the deepest longings of the human heart. By our Baptism and Confirmation we have an obligation to live the Gospel and by our witness, to help bring about the victory of the Culture of Life over the culture of death.

FROM FR. JOHN VAUGHAN'S EXCELLENT HOMILY FOR THE GOLDEN JUBILEE MASS:

It was on July 22, 2016, (Feast of St. Mary Magdalen) that Pope Francis "made public an Apostolic Constitution on Women's Contemplative Life entitled "Seeking the Face of God." (*Vultum Dei Quaerere*). In this document the Holy Father highlighted the foundational values of contemplative life, characterized by Silence, Listening, and Stability.

"These values are so contrary to our contemporary world. In our world of political campaigns, sound bites, TV's in multiple locations throughout a home, ear-buds and I-phones etc., where do we find the silence? Who takes time to listen? On some Sunday's I take an extended time of quiet after Holy Communion thinking to myself that this may be the last moment of silence many in the congregation will have all day. Your contemplative silence is a witness, a gift and an important reminder to all of us that it is in the silence that we will hear God speak. In a rapidly changing and hectic world, a world of great mobility and temporary jobs and commitments, your witness of stability and permanence is also a welcomed gift.

"Pope Francis quotes St. Augustine, 'You have made us for yourself O God, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you." Whether known or realized, all the longings, the hungers, thirsts and desires that drive our lives and motivate our decisions are essentially a search for God. Contemplative Life is a Prophetic life standing as a sign of that which is truly important, the 'one thing necessary.' True happiness is our relationship with Jesus Christ, our way, truth and life. Your witness is a profound gift to the Church and to the world.

"Sr. Mary Magdalen, as we celebrate your five decades of faithful witness, we first of all celebrate God's




FROM A RETREATANT:

A SAINT OF THE PASSIONIST COMMUNITY



Bessed Lorenzo Maria of Saint Francis Xavier, (also known as Lorenzo Salvi), was born October 30, 1782 in Rome, Italy. He studied for the priesthood at the Jesuit-run Collegio Romano in Rome; his classmates included the future Pope Gregory XVI.


Lorenzo was greatly impressed by the preaching and zeal of Saint Vincent Strambi and soon followed him into the Passionist Congregation. He became a novice at Monte Argentario in 1801, the first monastery of the Passionists. He received the religious name Lorenzo Maria of Saint Francis Xavier and professed his vows on November 20, 1802, and was ordained a priest on December 29, 1805. He followed closely in the footsteps of the founder of the Passionists, St. Paul of the Cross.

The anti-clerical laws of Napoleon saw the Passionist house suppressed and its members dispersed. When at last Lorenzo was able to return to Passionist life he preached missions and encouraged devotion to the Passion of Christ, these two things are the hallmarks of the Passionist life. But he also gained the reputation of a most wise and admired superior for his ability to ably lead communities.

He had great devotion to the Infant Jesus and was steadfast in promoting, in every circumstance, prayerful devotion to the holy childhood of Jesus, not only through his untiring work, but also through his constant example and his proliferation of writings. He often wrote about and preached on the wonders of the Incarnation. Because of this great devotion he is usually depicted in religious art with a picture of the Child Jesus.

Lorenzo was made Rector of the Passionist generalate in Rome, SS John and Paul, but spent much of his time preaching missions. His Vice-Rector was Blessed Dominic Barberi, the great Passionist saint who labored in England.

Blessed Lorenzo died June 12, 1856 at Capranica, Viterbo, Italy of natural causes. He is buried in the Passionist church of St. Angelo, Vetralla (Viterbo). October 1, 1989 Lorenzo Maria of St. Francis Xavier was beatified by Pope Saint John Paul II. His Feastday is June 12. Blessed Lorenzo, ora pro nobis!

ur community and our Passionist Oblates were so blessed in early August to welcome Fr. Charles P. Connor, Ph.D., to our monastery. Many of you may recognize Father from his frequent appearances on the Eternal Word Television Network over many years. During his time with us, Father gave four private conferences to our community, and then preached the annual Oblate retreat, August 5-7. He powerfully opened up to us the depth of the spiritual legacy of Venerable Archbishop Fulton J. Sheen, whose teachings are very prophetic in the light of current national and world events. The Oblates were so graced by their retreat that they invited Father back next year.

Fr. Connor's love for and association with the Passionists goes back many decades as he grew up in the Scranton PA diocese. His father's brother, Fr. Julian Connor, C.P., was a well-known preacher of missions and retreats, as well as a chaplain and confessor to the Passionist Nuns first in Scranton and then in Clarks Summit PA.

Currently, Fr. Connor teaches at Mount St. Mary's Seminary in Emmitsburg, Maryland. He is author of many books and DVD courses and has recently published <u>The Spiritual Legacy of Archbishop Fulton J. Sheen</u>, available from St. Paul's Alba House Publishers. His many historical DVD's can be obtained from the EWTN Religious Catalog.
